

Town Council Meeting May 19, 2022



A quorum being duly present, President Matthew Levesque called the May 19, 2022, Town Council meeting to order at 7:04 PM.

An announcement was made by President Levesque regarding the meeting being televised live and questioning if anyone was actively taping the session to please make their presence known. This session is recorded and broadcast on Channel 18.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Councilor Atsalis. President Levesque followed with a moment of silence asking for all to remember the Ukraine and all other countries struggling. He hoped we would all keep peace for all in our thoughts and prayers.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Mary St. George a member of the Friends of Centerville Bog allocated her speaking time to Matt Dupuy.

Scott Lee allocated his remaining time to Matt Dupuy.

Robert Ward allocated his remaining time to Matt Dupuy.

President Leveque asked Karen Nober, Town Attorney if allocating of the speaking time was a proper use at Public Comment. She indicated it was up to the Council to allow. President Levesque asked Matt Dupuy how much time would he need to discuss the Centerville Bog Issue. Matt Dupuy said it would be 4 to 6 minutes.

Matt Dupuy discussed the 16 acres that comprised the cranberry bog. He noted the bog was shaped similar to that shape of the country of Africa. He spoke about the prior use of the private property with neighbors utilizing the bog as a walk way/dog walk way. He felt the bog should be preserved as Open Space because it seems to get more recreational use than any other piece of land in Barnstable. He explained the Town's first right of refusal on the land and the agricultural taxes levied for the last few years. He mentioned research that was sent to Mark Ells, Town Manager who had a meeting with the Friends of Centerville Bog. He hoped the Town would work with the Barnstable Land Trust to preserve this land.

Robert Ward agreed with Matt Dupuy. He felt the Town should purchase or assign the land to the Barnstable Land Trust.

Robert Indresano asked for a restart on Statute 61A - Assessment and Taxation of Agricultural

and Horticultural Land - regarding the cranberry bog.

Rob Boone felt the seller did not comply with Statute 61A which now means it is a defective title.

Meaghan Mort spoke about comments regarding her as not worthy to being on the Local Comprehensive Planning Committee (LCPC). She felt she is worthy and as a year-round renter has perspective that is needed on the planning committee. She thanked Council for approving her application.

Close Public Commit

Response to Public Comment:

(Atsalis) said he was embarrassed and ashamed that Meaghan Mort was deemed unworthy to serve on the LCPC. He felt the language and conversation was arrogant and high handed.

(Cullum) agreed with Atsalis. She added Meaghan Mort is a demographic that is usually not heard. She advocated for all voices to be heard.

(Hebert) Explained that the Council was listening and Meaghan Mort was being heard. He said rents are going up in price and felt the need to recognize the housing crisis in Barnstable.

(Levesque) Meaghan Mort is quite worthy and has a wise perspective and journey. It is important to hear her stories and to help support each other in the community. If one is unworthy then we are all unworthy. It is unfortunate this incident happened.

(Shaughnessy)She addressed the Cranberry Bog issue. She said the sellers; the Jenkins Family were gracious to allow the neighborhood to utilize their personal property. Now Jenkins family has sold it and she hoped the community remembered this kindness.

Town Manager's Report

Town Manager Mark Ells spoke about the July 4th Fireworks. He explained the Massachusetts Wildlife would not allow the July 4th fireworks go on as scheduled. The fireworks occur in the Lewis Bay which is close to a Plover and Tern nesting area. He had spoken with Derek Lawson, Director of Marine and Environmental Affairs regarding moving the fireworks display to September. This change would allow for the Plovers and Terns to nest and the fireworks in September is not during nesting season. He said the Town has exercise its right to have the fireworks in September and will look at other options to hold the display.

(Atsalis) Is this going to be a challenge every July? (Ells) Yes but we will look at every option.

Town Manager Mark Ells is forgoing his Town Manager Communications this evening, it is available on the website and attached to these minutes.

Upon a motion duly made and seconded it was

ORDERED: That the Code of the Town of Barnstable, Part I General Ordinances, Chapter 240 Zoning be amended as follows:

SECTION 1

That Chapter 240, Article II, Section 6, The Zoning Map of the Town of Barnstable Massachusetts is hereby amended to expand the Ground-Mounted Solar Photovoltaic Overlay District to include the parcels shown on Assessors' Map 013 as Parcels 004, 005, and 052 as shown on the maps entitled;

- "Proposed Amendment to the Town Zoning Map Expanding the Ground Mounted Solar Photovoltaic Overlay District In Marstons Mills"
- "Proposed Amendment to the Marstons Mills Zoning Map expanding the Ground Mounted Solar Photovoltaic Overlay District In Marstons Mills"

Each dated October 1, 2021, as prepared by the Town of Barnstable Geographical Information System (GIS) Unit.

SECTION 2

- By amending the definition of AS-OF-RIGHT-SITING in Section D of Article V, Section 240-44.2, Ground-Mounted Solar Photovoltaic Overlay District, by deleting the first sentence and inserting the following new sentence in place thereof:
 "The ground-mounted solar photovoltaic installation may proceed without the need for a special permit, variance, amendment, waiver or other local discretionary approval, except that a special permit shall be required when located in a residential zoning district."
- (2) By inserting the following definition of **HAZARDOUS PRODUCT** in said Section D immediately after the definition of **GROUND-MOUNTED SOLAR PHOTOVOLTAIC INSTALLATION**:

"HAZARDOUS PRODUCT

Any chemical or combination of chemicals which, in any form, is listed by trade name, chemical name, formula or otherwise as a product which is a hazard to public drinking water supplies if concentrations beyond a certain level are achieved therein. 'Hazardous product' shall also include any product for which there is any listing, declaration, or announcement in any form issued by the Unites States Environmental Agency, the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, or by any other government agency having direct or indirect jurisdiction over public water supplies that such product is such a hazard or is a product known as an "emerging contaminant" suspected as being capable of being a carcinogen."

SECTION 3

By amending Subsection (1) of Section E of Article V, Section 240-44.2 by adding the following sentence to the end of such subsection:

"Any ground-mounted, large-scale solar photovoltaic installation with 250 kw or larger of rated nameplate capacity located in a residential zoning district shall also be required to obtain a special permit from the Planning Board in accordance with Subsection (3)."

SECTION 4

By further amending Section E of Article V, Section 240-44.2 by adding the following new Subsection (3):

(3) Special Permit Provisions.

A Special Permit shall be granted by the Planning Board if the Planning Board determines the following criteria have been met.

- (a) Site Plan Approval in accordance with subsections (1) and (2).
- (b) Adequate measures to contain and suppress noise and sound as deemed appropriate by the Planning Board, including, but not limited to, minimum 75-foot setback from all residential abutter property lines to the Ground-Mounted Solar Photovoltaic Installation.
- (c) Vegetative and/or hardscape screening with coniferous planting and earth berms of sufficient height, as determined by the Building Commissioner, to screen adjoining residential properties from the Ground-Mounted Solar Photovoltaic Installation.
- (d) Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) approval of Solar Glare Study, if such a study is deemed necessary by the FAA.
- (e) Cape Cod Commission approval as required.
- (f) Full disclosure of all hazardous products proposed to be used at any time at a project site shall be provided in writing to the Planning Board with the Special Permit application; no application for a special permit shall be considered complete until such disclosure is submitted to the Planning Board. No such hazardous materials shall be deployed or used at any time at a project site without approval of the Special Permit by the Planning Board.
- (g) Use, storage and containment of hazardous materials shall comply with all Federal, State, Regional, and local codes and regulations, including building, fire, and health codes.
- (h) Compliance with any other criteria found by the Planning Board as necessary to protect the public health, safety or welfare, which may include, without limitation, the revocation of any prior permits and previous uses that benefit the project site."

SECTION 5

By amending Section I of Article V, Section 240-44.2 by deleting Section I in its entirety and inserting the following new Section I in its place:

"I. Dimensional requirements. Ground-mounted solar photovoltaic installations are subject to the front, side and rear yard setbacks as set forth in the underlying zoning district(s), except that any ground-mounted, large-scale solar photovoltaic installation with 250 kw or larger of rated nameplate capacity located in a residential zoning district shall maintain a minimum 75-foot setback from all abutting residential property lines to contain noise as sound, as required by Subsection (3) (b)."

SECTION 6

By amending Section L of Article V, Section 240-44.2 by adding the following subsections after subsection 2(c):

- (3) Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) approval of Solar Glare Study is required, if such a Study is deemed necessary by the FAA.
- (4) The project proponent shall provide full disclosure of all hazardous products proposed to be used at any time at a project site shall be provided in writing to the Building Commissioner with the Site Plan Review application; no application for Site Plan Review shall be considered complete until such disclosure is submitted to the Building Commissioner. No such hazardous materials shall be deployed or used at any time at a project site without Site Plan approval.
- (5) Use, storage and containment of hazardous materials shall comply with all Federal, State, Regional, and local codes and regulations, including building, fire, and health codes.
- (6) The project shall demonstrate compliance with any other criteria found by the Building Commissioner as necessary to protect the public health, safety or welfare, which may

include, without limitation, the revocation of any prior permits and previous uses that benefit the project site."

Open Public Hearing

Public Comment:

Anne Salas asked the Legal Department to investigate on whether a prohibition on battery energy storage systems in all zones will hold up to a legal challenge. Having the battery storage close to our homes is very concerning.

Rob Wilson who was a neighborhood and abutter to a previous solar array system that was put into Barnstable I moved because the existing activity on the land continued. I am supportive of the solar energy.

Close Public Hearing

Councilor questions and comments:

(Connolly) Regarding the citizen petition does elicit 2 questions: does the Town have the authority to adopt a moratorium ordinance and the language of the citizen petition is this legal? Municipalities do have Home Rule Powers under an amendment to the Constitution. This allows us to adopt more stringent ordinances provided they are not inconsistent with state law. However a municipality does not have the authority to impose development moratorium with unlimited amount of time or without a basis for study. Notwithstanding there are 2 areas of language in the Citizen's Petition that would not stand a legal challenge: the language 150 percent of the documented average use which would be labeled void for vagueness and the open ended undefined timeline. Recommendation regarding the citizen petition was not to adopt this mortarium as written. (Schnepp) Could petition come back? (Connolly Yes if the petition is substantially different and it would be up to the Planning Board.(Starr) Planning Board can write their own moratorium and the Town can set aside time to study the item. (Connolly) Yes this does not have to be a Citizen Petition.

(Schnepp) What are we voting for? (Nober) This is a vote to take a vote on the merits. You will subsequently vote after the vote to move the question.
